



## **Job Posting: Wildlife Rehabilitator January 2024**

The Wildlife Center of Virginia is an internationally acclaimed teaching and research hospital for wildlife and conservation medicine, located in Waynesboro, Virginia, in the heart of the Shenandoah Valley. The Center's mission is to "teach the world to care about and care for wildlife and the environment." Since its founding in 1982, the Center has cared for nearly 100,000 wild animals, representing 200 species of native birds, mammals, reptiles, and amphibians. The current annual caseload averages about 3,800 patients.

The Wildlife Center has a professional staff of about 30 individuals who work together in the veterinary, outreach, development, and operations departments. While each of these departments carries out different functions, all staff work closely together as a team to support one another and the Center's overall mission.

### **Position Description**

As part of the rehabilitation team, wildlife rehabilitators are responsible for a variety of tasks, including animal care, husbandry, nutrition, and, most importantly, training. This position reports to the Wildlife Rehabilitation Supervisor and is a member of the Veterinary Department.

### **Duties and Responsibilities**

#### **I. Animal Care**

- Provide excellent rehabilitative care to all patients at the facility.
- Daily cleaning and feeding of all patient animals housed at the facility.
- Evaluate patients for release. Monitor animal's health, attitude, appetite, etc., and maintain written records of each animal's progress. Report evaluations to veterinarians and participate in daily clinical rounds with veterinary staff to discuss medical cases.
- Exercise all flighted raptors daily and record progress in patient record.
- Assist with restraint, examination, diagnostic procedures, and treatment of animals.
- Admit patients and complete associated records. May also examine and initiate first aid to patients or new arrivals in the absence of the veterinarian or technician, within constraints of training and experience.
- Communicate with other permitted rehabilitators in the state to transfer healthy animals out of the hospital. Arrange for transportation to transfer site as needed.
- In conjunction with veterinary staff, develop and improve rehabilitation protocols for birds, reptiles, amphibians, and mammals.
- On a regular basis and in conjunction with the Rehab Supervisor and Director of Veterinary Services, re-evaluate protocols and give input on accepted procedures.
- Maintain high standards of cleanliness and organization in hospital, kitchen, and animal housing areas.

#### **II. Training**

- Train, supervise, and mentor rehabilitation intern, rehabilitation externs (students), animal care volunteers, and community service volunteers. This includes daily oversight as well as orientation and mid-term and final evaluations of rehabilitation intern and rehabilitation externs.



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- Train and mentor permitted rehabilitation apprentices as needed.
- Develop and lead educational programming for rehabilitation externs and veterinary and veterinary technician externs.
- Assist in teaching veterinary and veterinary technician interns and externs about rehabilitation/caretaking protocols.
- Teach developed courses to rehabilitators and volunteers as needed.
- Present at and provide support for the Wildlife Center of Virginia's annual three-day *Call of the Wild* conference, a hybrid conference which draws about 400 participants.
- When travel funding permits, submit one abstract per year to speak at an external national or regional rehabilitation conference (NWRA, NYSWRC, etc.)

### **III. Other duties**

- Daily and seasonal maintenance of enclosures, grounds, perches, etc. Recognize and correct any maintenance or safety hazards when possible. Report other problems to the Rehab Supervisor and/or Director of Veterinary Services.
- Acquire six hours of continuing education yearly to maintain permit.
- Obtain International Wildlife Rehabilitation Council (IWRC) Certified Wildlife Rehabilitator (CWR) designation within one year of start date. Renew permit every two years.
- As a team, coordinate with other rehabilitation staff to ensure daily coverage of hospital [weekdays, weekends, holidays, and snow days].
- Write at least one article per year for submission to a national wildlife rehabilitation journal.
- Act as primary on-call for the after-hours phone one to two nights per week, as needed.
- Assist in creation of a collection of photographs of mammals, reptiles, amphibians, and birds for classes, workshops, and educational/promotional materials.
- Provide staff support for Center events, including annual fall Gala and Benefit Auction as well as other large-scale donor events throughout the year.
- Other duties, responsibilities, and special projects, as requested.

### **Required Qualifications**

- Commitment to wildlife, conservation, and the environment
- Professional appearance and demeanor
- 2023-2024 COVID-19 Vaccine
- Pre-exposure rabies vaccination required. Provide proof of vaccination or adequate titer within the previous two years of start date.
- Ability to lift/carry equipment and animals up to 50 pounds.
- Demonstrated reliability and dependability; willingness to work weekends and holidays as necessary.
- Ability to lift/carry equipment and animals up to 50 pounds
- Must be able to handle emotional aspects of euthanasia

### **Preferred Qualifications**

- Bachelor's degree preferred.
- At least one year of wildlife rehabilitation experience



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- Ability to work independently.
- Demonstrated ability to handle diverse, competing tasks independently, efficiently, and accurately in a fast pace environment; flexibility is a must.
- Ability to organize, set goals, and meet deadlines; attention to detail.
- Team player with strong interpersonal and communication skills.

### **Salary & Benefits**

Compensation is negotiable based on experience and qualifications, starting at \$18 per hour

The Wildlife Center of Virginia offers the following benefits:

- After the first 90 days of employment, employees receive paid sick leave (accruing at four hours/month), personal time (40 hours a year), and vacation time (starting at 80/hours a year for new employees, which increases with length of employment).
- Eligible for Center's health insurance plan; Center pays half of employee's premium.
- Pension plan, with employer match (up to four percent)
- Continuing education opportunities for professional development.
